Offensive Player of the Week



Columbia senior quarterback **M.A. OLAWALE** (San Francisco, Calif.) led the Lions to their best offensive showing in nine years (since 2000) with a season-opening 40-28 win over Fordham. Olawale showed he is a dual threat, throwing for two touchdowns and rushing for two more. He finished 13-of-23 for 167 yards, and 29 rushing attempts for 50 net yards. The senior captain was named Columbia's most valuable player of the Liberty Cup game, as selected by media members in attendance.

Defensive Player of the Week



Cornell senior linebacker **CHRIS COSTELLO** (Katonah, N.Y.) was all over the field in the Big Red's 33-9 victory over Bucknell. Costello had 14 tackles, including 1.5 tackles for a loss and a pass breakup against the Bison's spread offense. The 14 tackles were the second-most in his career behind only 19 against Penn in the 2008 season finale. Six of Costello's stops were solo tackles and his pass breakup ended a second-half Bucknell drive. He spearheaded a Big Red defense with just two returning starters to limit Bucknell to 238 yards and just 3.2 yards per play.

Special Teams Player of the Week



Yale senior punter/placekicker **TOM MANTE** (Westford, Mass.) connected on a 50-yard field goal, the longest in school history since Ed Perks connected on a 52-yarder against Cornell in 1990, in the Bulldogs' 31-10 win over Georgetown. A dual-kicking specialist, Mante averaged 42.8 yards on six punts with punts of 73 (two shy of the school record) and 65 yards. He recovered his own onside kick and tallied seven points (1 FG, 4 PATS) on the day.

Rookie of the Week



Columbia freshman punter **MICHAEL WILLIAMSON** (Norway, S.C.) punted six times for 244 yards for an average of 40.7 yards per punt. His six punts included a 51-yarder and two inside the 20.

Team-by-Team Notes

BROWN

Junior QB **Kyle Newhall** had an impressive collegiate debut as Brown's starting quarterback, completing 29 of 45 passes for 267 yards and three touchdowns. Newhall won the starting nod over three other quarterbacks coming out of fall preseason practice. The Bears' loss to Stony Brook ended head coach **Phil Estes'** six-game, season-opening winning streak. He is now 8-4 lifetime in opening-day games.

COLUMBIA

Columbia's 40 points in its win over Fordham was the most points since a 49-21 win over Dartmouth on October 21, 2000. That season the Lions scored 40+ points three times. Head coach **Norries Wilson** is now 2-2 in season openers at Columbia. With 160 career receptions entering the Lions' matchup with Central Connecticut State, senior WR/RS **Austin Knowlin** is just 16 receptions away from tying the Columbia career record of 176 set by **Don Lewis** (1981-83). He now has 1,920 career receiving yards trailing Lewis by only 287 yards for second all-time.

CORNELL

The Cornell offense was full of big plays against Bucknell, as five different skill position players had plays of 30 yards or more, including three going for touchdowns. Senior WR/RS **Bryan Walters** set the Ivy League record for career kick returns (97) with three returns for 92 yards, including a 63-yard return to open the second half that took all the wind out of a possible Bucknell comeback after halftime.

DARTMOUTH

Sophomore CB/KR **Shawn Abuhoff's** defensive extra point against Colgate was just the second in Dartmouth history. The first came against Cornell in 1993. Five defenders had at least 10 tackles in the Colgate game -- senior FS **Tony Pastoors** (16), sophomores LB **Royce Egeolu** (13), LB **Diego Fernandez-Soto** (12) and CB **J.B. Andreassi** (10), plus junior DE **Charles Bay** (10). Sophomore WR **Michael Reilly** caught his first career touchdown pass, a 57-yard bomb, in the first quarter. It was just his third career reception, finishing the day with four catches to double his total from a year ago.

HARVARD

Following its 27-20 loss to Top-10 foe Holy Cross, Harvard saw its all-time record in season-opening games dip to 111-23-2 (.816). The Crimson has won its opening game in seven of the last nine years and is 10-6 on opening day under head coach **Tim Murphy**. First-year starting junior QB **Collier Winters** drove the Crimson 79 yards on its first drive and capped it with a five-yard touchdown pass against the Crusaders. He finished the game 22-of-37 for 195 yards and two touchdowns.

PENN

Penn's matchup with Villanova marked its NCAA-record 1,294th game in program history. The Villanova game was the 14th consecutive game in which the Quakers did not allow a 100-yard rusher. Coming in ranked No. 2 in the media and coaches' polls, Villanova was officially the highest ranked team Penn had ever faced in FCS play (since 1978). Against the Wildcats, Penn scored for the 111th straight game, the third longest streak in Ivy League history. Brown holds the record at 129 games and counting. Penn has never been shut out at home under head coach **Al Bagnoli**.

PRINCETON

For the fourth straight season, a new quarterback started the season opener for Princeton. Sophomore QB **Tommy Wornham** took over the reigns as the Tigers' signal caller after **Jeff Terrell**, **Bill Foran** and **Brian Anderson** started each of the last three seasons. Wornham went 24-of-41 for 198 yards one touchdown in his debut. For the first time in school history, Princeton will use four captains this season. Seniors OT **Mark Paski** and TB **Jordan Culbreath** will share the offensive responsibilities, while classmates LB **Scott Britton** and SS **Wilson Cates** will share the defensive responsibilities.

YALE

Senior TE **A.J. Haase** scored his first touchdown and Yale's first of the year in the win over Georgetown on a 28-yard pass over the middle from first-year starting sophomore QB **Patrick Witt**, who transferred from Nebraska, in the first quarter. Junior DL **Joe Young** had Yale's only sack of the day against the Hoyas. Wearing No. 28, freshman RB **Mordecai Cargill** got his first carry, a 10-yard run, in the first half against Georgetown. In second row of the stands at Multi-Sport Field watching his first game as an alum was **Mike McLeod**, who also wore No. 28 for the Bulldogs, McLeod owns every Yale rushing record and was the 2007 Ivy League Player of the Year.

Ivy Notes

54TH SEASON OF IVY FOOTBALL

The 2009 season marks the 54th season of Ivy League Football. This season, 28 games involving Ivy teams will be broadcasted on television and/or national satellite radio, including four games on VERSUS and 13 games on SIRIUS Satellite Radio. The Penn-Dartmouth game was added to the VERSUS schedule on September 18. Kickoff time for the October 3 game has been changed from 1:30 p.m. to Noon.

DRADDY AWARD RENAMED FOR COLUMBIA'S CAMPBELL

The National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame has renamed college football's premiere scholar-athlete award, the Vincent dePaul Draddy Trophy, in honor of **William V. Campbell**, the chairman of Intuit, former player and head coach at Columbia University and the 2004 recipient of the NFF's Gold Medal.

Known as "The Coach of Silicon Valley," Bill Campbell has become one the country's most influential business leaders, playing critical roles in the success of Apple, Google, Intuit and countless other high-tech companies. The captain of the 1961 Columbia Ivy League championship team, he found his true calling after an unlikely career change at age 39 from football coach to advertising executive. His ability to recruit, develop, and manage talented executives - all lessons learned on the gridiron - have proven to be a critical component of his ability to inspire his business teams to the highest levels of success.

On September 8, a group of the nation's top business leaders gathered at the Cantor Arts Center on the campus of Stanford University in Palo Alto, Calif., to honor Campbell. NFF Board Member **Mike Moe**, who works closely with Campbell in the venture capital field, welcomed the a-list crowd of approximately 150 people, including Apple co-founder and CEO **Steve Jobs**, Google co-founder and president **Larry Page**, Google CEO **Eric Schmidt**, eBay CEO **John Donahoe**, Hewlett Packard EVP **Todd Bradley**, and **John Doerr**, one of the top partners at Kleiner Perkins Caufield & Byers.

BUCHANAN WATCH LIST

Penn senior cornerback **Chris Wynn** was named one of the 20 players named to the preseason watch list for Buck Buchanan Award, presented by *The Sports Network* annually to the top defensive player in the Football Championship Subdivision.

Named to *The Sports Network's* All-America third team last season, Wynn's five interceptions led the Quaker defense a top ranking nationally in 2008. He added 40 tackles last season, two tackles for loss and one blocked kick. The Flemington, N.J., native is also one of the explosive return men in FCS, with a 25.1 career average with two touchdowns as a kickoff returner and nine yards per return on punts, including a 10.6 average last season.

The three Buchanan Award finalists will be announced on November 30 and will be invited to the 23rd annual Sports Network Awards banquet on December 17 in Chattanooga, Tenn., the night before the NCAA Division I Football Championship Game. The Walter Payton Award and the Eddie Robinson Award will also be presented that night.

HARVARD'S LEWIS NAMED TO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

A pioneer in athletics and politics, Harvard's **William Henry Lewis** was among the 16 players and two coaches named to the 2009 College Football Hall of Fame.

Lewis became the 108th Ivy Leaguer to be named to the hall of fame as a player to go along with the 29 Ivy coaches who have earned this prestigious honor.

A center at Harvard from 1892-93, Lewis was the first ever African-American to earn First Team All-America honors. He helped Harvard compile a daunting 22-2 record during his career with the Crimson. Lewis selected by the National Football Foundation's Football Bowl Subdivision Veterans Committee from the national ballot of 76 candidates and a pool of hundreds of eligible nominees.

The 2009 College Football Hall of Fame FBS Class will be inducted at the National Football Foundation Annual Awards Dinner on December 8, 2009, at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City. They will be officially enshrined at the Hall in South Bend, Ind., during ceremonies in the summer of 2010.

IVIES IN THE NFL

The Ivy League boasts eight former players among the 1,696 National Football League active players during 2009-10 NFL season.

Recent grads **Desmond Bryant** [Harvard '09] and **Colin Cloherty** [Brown '09] earned spots joining a veteran group of former Ivy standouts who have earned All-Pro and Pro Bowl selections and Super Bowl titles. **Dennis Norman** [Princeton '01], who was released by the Jacksonville Jaguars just prior to the regular season after five years, was signed by the San Diego Chargers on September 16.

Missing from the list this year are **Steve Cargile** [Columbia '04], who spent the 2006-08 seasons with the Denver Broncos; **Casey Cramer** [Dartmouth '05], who was waived by the Tennessee Titans just prior to the season after spending the 2008 season with the Miami Dolphins and the 2006-07 seasons with the Titans; **Clifton Dawson** [Harvard '07], who played with the Indianapolis Colts during the 2007 and 2008 seasons and was released with an injury settlement by the Houston Texans entering the season; **Jonathan Dekker** [Princeton '06], who spent the 2006-07 seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers; **Zak Keasey** [Princeton '05], who was released by the San Francisco 49ers with an injury settlement after breaking his forearm in a preseason game against Denver; and **Nate Lawrie** [Yale '04], who played in eight games for the Cincinnati Bengals in 2008.

Paul Raymond [Brown '08] spent time on the practice squads for the New York Jets, Detroit Lions and New York Giants and was most recently waived by the Cleveland Browns prior to this season. 2008 Ivy League Player of the Year **Chris Pizzotti** [Harvard '09] signed with the New York Jets as an undrafted free agent following the 2009 NFL Draft but was waived just prior to the start of the regular season.

BROWN'S DeOSSIE, MOREY NAMED TO 2009 PRO BOWL

Two Ivy League former standouts, Brown's **Zak DeOssie** and **Sean Morey**, earned selection to the 2009 Pro Bowl following the 2008-09 National Football League season. Morey, a member of the Super Bowl XLIII participant Arizona Cardinals, was named to his first Pro Bowl as the NFC's special teams starter in his eighth season. DeOssie, who won a Super Bowl ring in 2007 with Cornell's **Kevin Boothe** and Penn's **Jim Finn** as members of the New York Giants, was selected as a "need" player by Philadelphia Eagles head coach **Andy Reid**.

IVY PRESEASON MEDIA POLL

For the third time in four years, Harvard was selected the favorite in the annual Ivy League Football Preseason Media Poll to win the 2009 Ivy title. Harvard received 10 of the 17 first-place votes from the media panel, tallying 129 points. The Crimson enters the 2009 season looking to capture its third-straight Ivy crown to become the first team to three-peat since Dartmouth in 1990-92. **Tim Murphy's** Harvard squad earned a share of the 2008 championship, becoming just the eighth team in history to bounce back from a loss in its League opener and still win the Ivy title.

PRESEASON ALL-AMERICA HONORS

The Ivy League was once again well-represented among the preseason national All-America accolades entering the 2009 season. A total of seven Ivies were named preseason first-, second- or third-team All-America, including multiple selections for Columbia senior wide receiver/return specialist **Austin Knowlin**, Penn junior kicker **Andrew Samson** and Harvard senior offensive tackle **James Williams**.

Knowlin totaled a team-best 1,072 all-purpose yards with six touchdowns in 2008. Williams was tabbed to *The Sports Network* preseason team for the second straight year, which has also given him season-end honors since 2007. Samson set a Penn single-season record with 16 field goals, which ranked him third in the nation, and also set school career mark hitting 49 PATs in a row, an active streak entering this season, during his first two years in a Quaker uniform.

The Leopards struggled on the ground, only churning out just 70 yards rushing, the fewest since its October 4, 2008, against Harvard when the Leopards only managed 71 on the ground ... Penn has 791 all-time win total is 11th all-time in Division I as Michigan, Texas, Notre Dame, Nebraska, Ohio State, Penn State and Alabama in the FBS and Yale and Harvard in the FCS have all reached 800 wins. Oklahoma currently stands two games in front of the Quakers with 793 wins.
