## Offensive Player of the Week



Harvard junior quarterback **COLLIER WINTERS** (Claremore, Okla.) accounted for all three Crimson touchdowns in a 24-21 win over Brown in a matchup between the defending Ivy League champions. Winters completed 18 of 27 passes for 223 yards and two touchdowns of 15 and 30 yards while also running for a game-high 51 yards including a three-yard touchdown run. He averaged 5.1 yards per carry on 13 attempts.

## Defensive Player of the Week



Cornell junior safety **ANTHONY AMBROSI** (Newton, Mass.) recorded four tackles all in the second half, including two for a loss, three pass breakups and a 20-yard interception return for a touchdown that provided the winning points in the Big Red's 14-12 win at Yale. Making his first career start, Ambrosi's pick six with 6:18 left in the third quarter was Cornell's first defensive score since the injured player he replaced, **Frank Morand**, found paydirt from 72 yards away in a 2007 win over Colgate. A converted running back, he forced a second-half punt by knocking down a pass, scored on the interception on the next possession and forced another punt with a fourth-quarter pass breakup. He led a defense that allowed less than 300 yards of offense to the Bulldogs and hounded Yale quarterback **Patrick Witt** into a 21-of-54 passing day that included 11 Cornell pass breakups in the secondary and three interceptions.

## Special Teams Player of the Week



Yale senior punter/placekicker **TOM MANTE** (Westford, Mass.) tied the Ivy League record with a 54-yard field goal in the Bulldogs' 14-12 loss to Cornell, becoming the first kicker in Ivy history to hit on field goals of 50 yards or more in back-to-back games. His long boot came on the final play of the first half and brought Yale to within a point (7-6) of the Big Red. Mante now shares the League mark with five others, but no kicker had reached from that distance since Penn's **Tim Mazzetti** in 1976. He also connected on a 23-yarder in the first quarter, accounting for half of the Bulldogs' points for the game. In his punting chores, Mante had a school-record 12 punts, including six inside the 20-yard line.

## Rookie of the Week



Penn freshman running back **LYLE MARSH** (Bethel Park, Pa.) led the game in rushing with twice as many yards as any other player and he did not touch the ball until the third quarter in the Quakers' 20-17 overtime loss at Lafayette. Marsh rushed five times in a row to start the second half, single-handedly getting Penn from its own 36-yard line to the Lafayette six, which led to a Quaker touchdown. On the next drive, he rushed two more times for seven yards, setting up Penn's long touchdown pass to tie the game at 17-17. He compiled 66 yards in the third quarter and 85 yards on 15 carries for the game, averaging 5.7 yards per rush.

## Team-by-Team Notes

### BROWN

Senior WR **Buddy Farnham** grabbed six catches against Harvard and ranks third in the nation in receptions with 9.0 per game. His 173 career receptions are fourth among active FCS players and 17th best in Ivy history. Junior quarterback **Kyle Newhall** ranks 13th nationally in total offense with 281.5 yards per game. Senior WR **Bobby Sewall**, who got into the end zone three times against Harvard, has scored more touchdowns (29) than any other Ivy player in the last three years. He is 14th among active FCS players in scoring with 174 points.

### COLUMBIA

With his second-consecutive game with over 100 rushing yards, senior RB **Ray Rangel** needs just 82 yards to best his last season's total yards. Senior WR/RS **Austin Knowlin** is just nine receptions away from becoming the Columbia all-time receptions leader, passing the current mark of 176 set by **Don Lewis** (1981-83). He now has 1,993 career receiving yards trailing Lewis by only 214 yards for second all-time. Columbia's linebackers combined for 51 tackles against Central Connecticut State, including junior LB **Marc Holloway**'s career-best 18 tackles.

### CORNELL

Cornell improved to 2-0 for the second-straight year. The Big Red managed just three first downs totalling 166 yards of offense in its 14-12 win at Yale. It marked the first time Cornell knocked off Yale in consecutive years since the 1995-97 seasons yielded three straight victories for the Big Red. Cornell scored on its first offensive play, as a double pass led to an 81-yard touchdown toss from senior WR **Stephen Liuzza** to classmate WR/RS **Bryan Walters** for the fifth-longest pass play in Big Red history. No one on the field was busier than junior P **Drew Alston**, who punted a Cornell-record 15 times, but did not allow one return yard.

### DARTMOUTH

Dartmouth gathered 314 yards of offense against a New Hampshire defense that ranked fourth in the FCS in rushing defense. The Big Green have lost 14 straight games, the second-longest slide in the FCS. The five Dartmouth turnovers against the Wildcats were the most since the Big Green coughed the ball up seven times against Brown on November 10, 2007. Senior SS **Tony Pastoors** had his second-straight game with double-digit tackles, recording 12 against New Hampshire. The Big Green got blocked PATs by junior DE **Matt Oh** and sophomore DE **Connor Phillips**, giving Dartmouth three blocked PATs on the season.

### HARVARD

With the win against Brown, Harvard has now won its Ivy League opener in 10 of the last 11 seasons with nine of those wins coming against the Bears. The Crimson has won 11 straight games at Harvard Stadium, having not lost at there since the end of the 2006 season. Harvard has won 17 of its last 18 home games. Senior LB **Jon Takamura**'s interception led to the eventual game-winning touchdown against Brown. He also broke up a pass in the end zone that could have won the game for the visiting Bears.

### PENN

In every single game during the 2008 season, Penn was victorious when holding opponents under 10 points (6-0). However, the team went 0-4 when giving up more than that number. The trend has continued thus far in 2009. In all, Penn has won the last six games when allowing 10 or fewer points and has lost the last eight when allowing more. With its Ivy opener at Dartmouth on VERSUS, the Quakers will be on national television for the third time in their last seven games as the team played on VERSUS against Brown on November 1 last season and on ESPNU the following week at Princeton on November 7. Penn is 1-1 in those games.

### PRINCETON

Junior LB **Steven Cody** scored the first points of the game in Princeton's win over Lehigh when he returned an interception 77 yards for a touchdown. It was the Tigers' first interception return for a score in four years. Including previous seasons, six of the Princeton's last seven wins have been by five points or fewer and four of them were in doubt with less than 10 seconds remaining. Princeton kept the trend going with its 17-14 victory at Lehigh.

### YALE

Yale had two scoring plays with no time left on the clock in its 14-12 loss to Cornell -- senior P/PK **Tom Mante**'s Ivy record-tying 54-yard field goal at the end of the first half and sophomore QB **Patrick Witt**'s one-yard touchdown run at the end of the game. The Yale defense allowed Cornell only first three downs but that was not the least allowed by a Eli defense. The Bulldogs held Princeton in 1945, Bates in 1951 and Lafayette in 1952 to only one offensive first down.

## Ivy Notes

### 54TH SEASON OF IVY FOOTBALL

The 2009 season marks the 54th season of Ivy League Football. This season, 28 games involving Ivy teams will be broadcasted on television and/or national satellite radio, including four games on VERSUS and 13 games on SIRIUS Satellite Radio. The Penn-Dartmouth game was added to the VERSUS schedule on September 18. Kickoff time for the October 3 game has been changed from 1:30 p.m. to Noon.

### DRADDY AWARD RENAMED FOR COLUMBIA'S CAMPBELL

The National Football Foundation & College Hall of Fame has renamed college football's premiere scholar-athlete award, the Vincent dePaul Draddy Trophy, in honor of **William V. Campbell**, the chairman of Intuit, former player and head coach at Columbia University and the 2004 recipient of the NFF's Gold Medal.

Known as "The Coach of Silicon Valley," Bill Campbell has become one the country's most influential business leaders, playing critical roles in the success of Apple, Google, Intuit and countless other high-tech companies. The captain of the 1961 Columbia Ivy League championship team, he found his true calling after an unlikely career change at age 39 from football coach to advertising executive. His ability to recruit, develop, and manage talented executives - all lessons learned on the gridiron - have proven to be a critical component of his ability to inspire his business teams to the highest levels of success.

On September 8, a group of the nation's top business leaders gathered at the Cantor Arts Center on the campus of Stanford University in Palo Alto, Calif., to honor Campbell. NFF Board Member **Mike Moe**, who works closely with Campbell in the venture capital field, welcomed the a-list crowd of approximately 150 people, including Apple co-founder and CEO **Steve Jobs**, Google co-founder and president **Larry Page**, Google CEO **Eric Schmidt**, eBay CEO **John Donahoe**, Hewlett Packard EVP **Todd Bradley**, and **John Doerr**, one of the top partners at Kleiner Perkins Caufield & Byers.

### BUCHANAN WATCH LIST

Penn senior cornerback **Chris Wynn** was named one of the 20 players named to the preseason watch list for Buck Buchanan Award, presented by *The Sports Network* annually to the top defensive player in the Football Championship Subdivision.

Named to *The Sports Network's* All-America third team last season, Wynn's five interceptions led the Quaker defense a top ranking nationally in 2008. He added 40 tackles last season, two tackles for loss and one blocked kick. The Flemington, N.J., native is also one of the explosive return men in FCS, with a 25.1 career average with two touchdowns as a kickoff returner and nine yards per return on punts, including a 10.6 average last season.

The three Buchanan Award finalists will be announced on November 30 and will be invited to the 23rd annual Sports Network Awards banquet on December 17 in Chattanooga, Tenn., the night before the NCAA Division I Football Championship Game. The Walter Payton Award and the Eddie Robinson Award will also be presented that night.

### HARVARD'S LEWIS NAMED TO COLLEGE FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

A pioneer in athletics and politics, Harvard's **William Henry Lewis** was among the 16 players and two coaches named to the 2009 College Football Hall of Fame.

Lewis became the 108th Ivy Leaguer to be named to the hall of fame as a player to go along with the 29 Ivy coaches who have earned this prestigious honor.

A center at Harvard from 1892-93, Lewis was the first ever African-American to earn First Team All-America honors. He helped Harvard compile a daunting 22-2 record during his career with the Crimson. Lewis selected by the National Football Foundation's Football Bowl Subdivision Veterans Committee from the national ballot of 76 candidates and a pool of hundreds of eligible nominees.

The 2009 College Football Hall of Fame FBS Class will be inducted at the National Football Foundation Annual Awards Dinner on December 8, 2009, at the Waldorf-Astoria in New York City. They will be officially enshrined at the Hall in South Bend, Ind., during ceremonies in the summer of 2010.

### IVIES IN THE NFL

The Ivy League boasts eight former players among the 1,696 National Football League active players during 2009-10 NFL season.

Recent grads **Desmond Bryant** [Harvard '09] and **Colin Cloherty** [Brown '09] earned spots joining a veteran group of former Ivy standouts who have earned All-Pro and Pro Bowl selections and Super Bowl titles. **Dennis Norman** [Princeton '01], who was released by the Jacksonville Jaguars just prior to the regular season after five years, was signed by the San Diego Chargers on September 16.

Missing from the list this year are **Steve Cargile** [Columbia '04], who spent the 2006-08 seasons with the Denver Broncos; **Casey Cramer** [Dartmouth '05], who was waived by the Tennessee Titans just prior to the season after spending the 2008 season with the Miami Dolphins and the 2006-07 seasons with the Titans; **Clifton Dawson** [Harvard '07], who played with the Indianapolis Colts during the 2007 and 2008 seasons and was released with an injury settlement by the Houston Texans entering the season; **Jonathan Dekker** [Princeton '06], who spent the 2006-07 seasons with the Pittsburgh Steelers; **Zak Keasey** [Princeton '05], who was released by the San Francisco 49ers with an injury settlement after breaking his forearm in a preseason game against Denver; and **Nate Lawrie** [Yale '04], who played in eight games for the Cincinnati Bengals in 2008.

**Paul Raymond** [Brown '08] spent time on the practice squads for the New York Jets, Detroit Lions and New York Giants and was most recently waived by the Cleveland Browns prior to this season. 2008 Ivy League Player of the Year **Chris Pizzotti** [Harvard '09] signed with the New York Jets as an undrafted free agent following the 2009 NFL Draft but was waived just prior to the start of the regular season.

### BROWN'S DeOSSIE, MOREY NAMED TO 2009 PRO BOWL

Two Ivy League former standouts, Brown's **Zak DeOssie** and **Sean Morey**, earned selection to the 2009 Pro Bowl following the 2008-09 National Football League season. Morey, a member of the Super Bowl XLIII participant Arizona Cardinals, was named to his first Pro Bowl as the NFC's special teams starter in his eighth season. DeOssie, who won a Super Bowl ring in 2007 with Cornell's **Kevin Boothe** and Penn's **Jim Finn** as members of the New York Giants, was selected as a "need" player by Philadelphia Eagles head coach **Andy Reid**.

### IVY PRESEASON MEDIA POLL

For the third time in four years, Harvard was selected the favorite in the annual Ivy League Football Preseason Media Poll to win the 2009 Ivy title. Harvard received 10 of the 17 first-place votes from the media panel, tallying 129 points. The Crimson enters the 2009 season looking to capture its third-straight Ivy crown to become the first team to three-peat since Dartmouth in 1990-92. **Tim Murphy's** Harvard squad earned a share of the 2008 championship, becoming just the eighth team in history to bounce back from a loss in its League opener and still win the Ivy title.
